Young Brothers' Preparation for Tropical Storm Olivia, Schedule Changes for the Week, and Recovery Efforts

HONOLULU, September 11, 2018 – As Tropical Storm Olivia approaches the Hawaiian Islands, based on conditions presently forecasted, the Company loaded Monday's barges at various ports and sailed them out to sea to ride out the storm. With the storm expected to impact Maui County on Wednesday, September 12, the Company also cancelled Tuesday's sailings to the Ports of Kahului, Kaunakakai, and Kaunapali.

"Young Brothers understands the critical nature of our business and sailed the barge, *Maka'ala* early to the Port of Nawiliwili," said Joe Boivin, President of Young Brothers. "The barge arrived early Tuesday morning, well ahead of the Coast Guard's closing of the port. Over 150 dry and refrigerated containers were made available for pickup, so the Kauai community would have the supplies ahead of Tropical Storm Olivia and could restock their shelves with supplies by this afternoon."

As of Tuesday, September 11, 2018, all Young Brothers' ports were closed by order of the United States Coast Guard ("USCG"). Young Brothers plans to resume normal cargo operations, as soon as Tropical Storm Olivia has safely passed the islands and the USCG issues the "All Clear" and re-opens the ports. Young Brothers will seek to undertake special sailings in the coming days, in an effort to ensure delivery of much needed supplies to the Neighbor Islands.
